

LOGLINE

Five characters face the alleged end of the world in Bugarach, the only place in the world that is supposed to be saved from the apocalypse.

D-day is approaching and fear, hope, faith, fame or greed are emerging. A fable in the shape of an existentialist comedy about the spiritual crisis of the West.





SYNOPSIS

Bugarach is a tiny village in southern France where everyone lives a quiet life, isolated from the world; until the day that the international media spreads the news that Bugarach is the only place that will allegedly survive doomsday.

The arrival of increasingly outlandish strangers soon begins to disturb the local population. The mayor tries to take control of the situation, but it's already too late; furthermore, he has helped to blow up the story himself.

We can see the consequences in the different characters that the documentary accompanies: Slide, the magician boy who sees the event as a great opportunity to become famous; Uranie, a millennarian who has a plan for his salvation; Mirko, a boy obsessed with weapons who wants to protect the village; and Monsieur Pouce, a scholar who knows everything about the region and who claims to have located the body of Christ underneath the mountain.

All these characters, along with the hunters and farmers of the village and the people who come to either save themselves or out of simple curiosity, are unfolding a landscape of existential emptiness that each one of them faces out of fear or in order to fill the void with the new values of modernism: fame, greed or the wildest beliefs.



DIRECTORS' NOTE

The subject of the apocalypse has always had its place in storytelling, from the novels of Jules Verne through to the science fiction of the 1950s to Orson Welles's radio "prank", but in 2012, the end of the world was really here.

At least that's what some people thought, or even hoped, as we have found during filming. Bugarach takes a unique situation within this context in order to dive deeper into the subject of the apocalypse and to reflect upon the fears and coping strategies of humankind in times of deep material and spiritual crisis in the Western world, the situation of the gradual invasion by esoterics and doomsdayers of a traditional, rural village purported to be the only place on the planet that will survive the apocalypse foretold by the Mayans.





The film is precisely about a moment in time we are witnesses of. The spiritual void has come crashing into a global crisis. Not just new age hippies are searching for answers.

A worldwide economic crash has shaken the very foundations of what we believed to be true and has made us doubt—on the very deepest level—what it is that drives us within our existence. When faced with the void, with nothingness, with a totally clean slate, what do people do? What choices do they—we—make? Bugarach presented us with an opportunity to witness how the fates of a motley crew of quirky, yet sincere, characters would converge on one single day. But what was really going on had to do with the sense of life and the scent of fear.

There were people fleeing—their environment, themselves—and others who were feeding off the fear of others only to create their own. Thus the film speaks to the situation of the human species, of the fear generated by it in our capacity for destruction, for uncontrolled growth without asking ourselves about the effects that our own evolution has had on our happiness and sustainability.

DIRECTORS

VENTURA DURALL, BARCELONA, 1974

An established director and producer, Durall's latest film, "The Wild Years", was premiered at IDFA, in competition for feature-length documentary in 2013. His short film "The Hidden Smile", was in Official Selection at the Sundance Film Festival 2012 and has been awarded Best Short Film in more than 15 international film festivals.

In 2009, his feature-length documentary "The Forgiveness" was selected in such festivals as IDFA, DOKLEIPZIG, THESSALONIKA or DOCSDF and awarded Best Documentary at the Belgrade International Documentary Festival, the Audience Award at the Mon-doc International Documentary Festival, and garnered recognition as the Silver Award Winner at World Media Festival.

Fiction feature "The Two Lives of Andrés Rabadán" has won, among other laurels, the Best European Independent Film in 2009 at the ECU Festival in Paris, the Grand Jury Prize at the Annecy Spanish Cinema Biennal in 2010, three Gaudí Awards from the Catalan Film Academy in 2010, and screened at the San Sebastian Film Festival.

Durall produced the above and other projects under the banner NANOUK FILMS, the production company he founded in 2000 with the intention of creating a benchmark artistic platform in the Catalan and European audiovisual scene and of establishing new communication channels between the documentary arena and fiction films. Durall also teaches at the Barcelona film school ESCAC where he is Head of the Documentary Department.

SERGI CAMERON, BARCELONA, 1987

Graduated from the ESCAC film school in 2007, Sergi has focused his career on directing movies such as "Cosas extrañas que brillan", "OVIS", "How great it is to have a moustache" and video clips for many bands.

Additionally, he has worked as an editor in movies like "The 5th Chromosome", "The Afterlife," "Le Cordon", "Limbo Starr: Diez cuenta atrás" and commercials. He combines his work in the visual field with musical projects, he composes and records soundtracks and he dedicates himself to music journalism.

SALVADOR SUNYER, GIRONA, 1987

Graduated from ESCAC specialising in documentaries. He further specialised in directing short films and artistic advertising which received numerous awards.

He has a close relationship with the world of international theatre and circus and has made several audiovisuals for the works of big international names like Sidi Larbi Cherkaoui, Pau Miró and Alex Rigola, the director of the Venice Theatre Biennale. He directed several documentaries such as "Veïns" (2009), "Porcs" (2009), "Migranland" (2013) which is currently in the editing room, and "The Hollywood Conquest" (2014) which is currently shot.
